

The Need for Transformation

- Early learning and child care are **crucial** to Ontario's success. Children, families and the economy benefit.
- Significant **challenges** in child care sector:
 - o outdated legislation and funding approach
 - o program quality
 - o accountability
- Need to develop a comprehensive vision and plan for child care that works with FDK.
- Government platform commitment: "work with our partners to modernize Ontario's child care system and support centres as they transition to offering affordable care to families with younger children."







Child care investments

- In 2012-13, **\$90 million** to modernize child care sector
 - Brings funding to more than **\$1 billion**, up 90% since 2003-04
- **\$133 million** allocated over 2 years to CMSMs/DSSAB
- \$3.3 million to First Nations
- **\$44 million** for retrofits and renovations to **school-based child care** centres transitioning to younger children

Long-term vision

- **High-quality**, **accessible** and **coordinated** early learning and child care for children before they start school and for school-aged children
- Learning in safe and caring play-based environments
- System that promotes healthy, physical, social, emotional and cognitive development and focuses on early identification and intervention for children in need of supports
- Services located in or linked with schools to enhance seamlessness for children and families, where possible







Guiding principles

- **Support** and **choice** for children and families
- Commitment to **quality programs** for all children
- Efficient funding formula
- Supportive legislation and regulations
- Evidence-based decision making and reporting

- 1. Operating funding formula
- 2. Capital funding priorities
- 3. Quality programs

Operating funding formula

To modernize the approach to operating funding within the next three years, the government will develop and implement a new, more **transparent** approach to funding that **responds to demand** for services, helps **stabilize fees** and improves **reliability** of child care, to better support child care operators and parents.





Capital funding priorities

To support child care operators as they adapt to full-day kindergarten over the next three years, the government will pursue a capital funding approach that emphasizes **child care spaces in schools** in order to increase **seamlessness** for children and **convenience** for families.







Quality programs


Over the next three years, the government will work to enhance program **quality** and **consistency** by developing **mandatory** provincial **program guidelines** for child care operators. We will also develop an updated **framework** to support children with **special needs** and offer new resources and information for **parents** and providers.







Modernized legislative and regulatory framework



To put the child care sector on the path towards modernization over the next three years, the government will propose **legislative** and **regulatory** amendments to reflect up-to-date **evidence** and experience and to support health, safety and quality for children, parents and providers.





Modernized legislative and regulatory framework

- How can the government more effectively harmonize standards across legislation as well as regulatory requirements in child care (e.g., numbers/ages of children in licensed vs. unlicensed home care)?
- How could new licensing approaches support home- and centre-based care in smaller, **rural** and **remote** communities (e.g., permitting home-based providers to care for more children where there is more than one provider, providing greater flexibility for family or mixed age groupings and space configurations)?





Support for accountability and capacity-building



As the government modernizes child care over the next three years, we will improve **data collection**, enhance licensing procedures and develop supports for parents and operators to help us better evaluate **outcomes**, support sector capacity, reduce duplication and improve **accountability**.
